The Right Sound

Roy Neys receives some of the communication that comes into our website and he sends these to other members in the club to answer questions and comments. I answer all the questions that are sent to me and sometimes there is an inquiry about finding a lost personal item. I answered one of these 'lost ring' inquiries in May. Dan explained to me that he and his family were clearing out noxious weeds at a community open space lot and that he lost a gold wedding ring somewhere in that lot. He didn't realize that it was gone until they were about done pulling weeds. He borrowed a metal detector and had other friends with detectors help him in his search for the lost ring a couple of days before I arrived. No ring! I made arrangements to meet Dan at the lot in Louisville early in the afternoon.

He explained that this ring was very important to him be-

cause it belonged to his grandfather and he was one of his heroes in life! I asked Dan how big the ring was so that I could determine what VDI number to look for and what tone I wanted to

hear. It was not a large class ring size but just an average gold band, so I figured that it would probably sound like a nickel. He walked me over to the lot and I was surprised at how big the field was. I knew that it would take several hours to search the entire area but I would give it a try for the afternoon before asking other Eureka! members for help. I used my White's XLT with a Bigfoot coil and marked grid areas with pin flags to insure better coverage. There was not much trash on the ground so I could recover nearly every surface target without spending all my time on unwanted targets. I covered up several holes that the other detector-

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ists left open while picking up pull tabs, pieces of aluminum and foil. I also picked up several clad coins which included a Lincoln spill of about 15 cents. Most of the good beeps ended up being a nickel, a shard of aluminum or a pull tab.

After about an hour and a half, I got one of those sweet solid beeps that had a nickel VDI of 20 and 21. Each swing revealed 20—20—21—20—20 and it seemed extra crisp at the ends of the beep tones so I hoped that target was the ring.



That was the right sound because a glint of gold was under the tall grass and I held what was surely Dan's lost ring! I called Dan and told him that I had his ring in my hand but he was in a meeting and couldn't get away for a couple of hours. I told Dan that the only pay that I would accept is a picture of his grandfather. I left the ring at his house and returned home. He sent me a picture of his grandfather with a big thanks and a comment that he will get the ring resized to fit his finger better!

Green Gables Elementary School Talk

Back in late October Mark Wilensky, a teacher that I have been friends with for a several years, asked me to come to the school where he teaches to give his sixth grade class a talk about metal detecting and maybe take the class out for a bit of detecting. In years past I have given a talk with his students and I had fellow Eureka! members take students out for a bit of detecting. But due to the late time of the year that Mark contacted me this year, we had to put off the talk and detecting. Finally in late April we set a date of Monday May 16th. This would give me time to set up volunteers and procure some Indian Head pennies to plant for the kids to find. During the general meeting I asked for volunteers to help out with this event. I ended up with three people that said that they could help out. Considering that the event was set for the following Monday, I was pretty happy to get that number of volunteers.



The 16th rolled around and the weather was less than ideal for taking the kids out detecting. Mark and I were in contact during the early morning hours. By mid-morning we decided to rescheduled the event for Wednesday. Unfortunately one of my volunteers, John Reynolds, was not able to help out on Wednesday due to his work schedule. I called Boots and Laura and inquired if they would be able to lend a hand and fortunately for me they were able to help out.

When Wednesday came around the forecast was not great but acceptable and worth a try.

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I arrived at the school shortly before noon. Before I was out of my car I noticed Boots and Laura driving up. We grabbed our gear and headed towards the school entry. We checked in at the school's administration office. Soon John Olson and Tom Peoples arrived so my team of volunteers was set and ready. I made my way into Mark's classroom and gave a quick talk about metal detecting. Discussing such things as: typical things we find, what can be found, how we help people find lost items, and how machines work and such.



Upon completion of my talk the students assembled and we headed outside to where my fellow Eurekaite's were preparing. We introduced ourselves and I gave a quick demonstration on how to swing a detector. After that each club member was selected by a student and we headed out to the grassy area that was planted with Indian Head pennies. Laura was quite popular with the young ladies in this class, and there were some that waited specifically to detect with her. I can't blame them for that. Each student was to detect until they found one of the Indian Head pennies and then we switched to a new student. Some students found their coin pretty quickly and others seemed to take a while. With each new student that Boots took on he showed them how to swing his machine, this was a great idea as I have a feeling that most of the students were not paying attention to my earlier display of how to swing a detector.

We managed to get our way through the majority of the 50 students before school was out. There were a few of the students that didn't have interest in detecting and they

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were not forced into it. It was very fun to see the eyes of the students when they held one of these 100+ year old coins. John, Boots, Laura, Tom and I all had a really good time during this event. If we get asked to do this again I hope to give more notice to allow for more people to help out.

In-Town Hunt Information

In-Town club hunts are meant to be fun, first and foremost. They provide a context outside of the meetings for fellowship with club members. To put on an in-town hunt you need to:

- Schedule with the Hunt Coordinator or President (see the contact list).
- Provide the Hunt Coordinator a plan.
- Send the hunt flyer to the newsletter editor in an appropriate format for insertion into the newsletter (see the contact list).
- Provide flyers at the monthly meeting.
- Ensure the hunt rules are discussed BEFORE the hunt.
- Police the hunt.
- Decide if the hunt is a members only or an open hunt (non-members may hunt).
- Write a story for the newsletter and send it and accompanying photos to the newsletter editor prior to that month's deadline.

To ensure the continuation of this hobby and to provide the best impression

of Eureka! and its membership, you, as hunt master, MUST enforce all rules, including:

1. Pouches to store finds and trash must be worn and used at all times during the hunt.
2. All hunters must wear headphones.
3. Absolutely no tolerance of holes left open (a first warning, followed by a time-out or expulsion from the hunt).
4. Hunters digging and leaving trash of any sort on the hunt field will receive the same treatment discussed above.

All hunts will need to be okayed by Hunt Coordinator (see the contact list) prior to officially being put in the newsletter and put on.

Failure to follow the guidelines may result in hunts being cancelled.

Hunts may be paid for in advance. This helps the hunt master with planning for how much should be planted in the field. In case a person must miss the hunt, their prepaid fee may be refunded if they call the hunt master before the hunt and cancel, other circumstances will be reviewed. No refund will be given for just plain failure to show up to the hunt.

Westminster requires a permit to metal detect in their city. It will be good for a year.
