

While there was hope that the Gold-N-Detectors name could be carried on, that possibility evaporated due to the State's handling of Louise Smyth's assets. Ultimately, it was decided to simply carry on the name of the Colorado Springs entity.

Mr. Vigil has a background in technical sales, E-commerce, and has been an online retailer and still operates a grocery outlet. He started Sunny Mountain Prospectors to support his "hobby" because he "couldn't find the prospecting equipment he wanted" locally. The Colorado Springs store has a

large online presence and manufactures its own line of some prospecting equipment. He is, also, the current president of the Pike's Peak Adventure League in Colorado Springs.

Sunny Mountain – Golden will carry prospecting equipment and most major brands of metal detecting equipment, including Garrett and Minelab, and "Gold machines." They will also carry accessories such as pin-pointers and tools. He noted that, at the moment, the Deus brand is difficult to procure due to their distribution issues.

Mr. Vigil said he's "looking at how Sunny Mountain can support Eureka THC", and his intention is to become a member of Eureka. But, as can be imagined, he's been buried with duties to both locations and the preparation for opening in Golden. 1812 MILITIA CUFF BUTTON

The Pound the Ground 2019 metal detecting event gave me the opportunity to do some metal detecting in New England. I had never been to that part of the country before and it was breathtakingly beautiful. Traveling with my fellow Eureka club members Jeff Lubbert, Ron and Linda Erickson, as well as Richard and Linda Kibler, we flew from Denver to Vermont then hit the road to Plattsburgh and Chazy in upstate New York along Lake Champlain. The fall colors in early October were amazing to see. At the event, it was great to see old friends, finally get to meet people I had only talked to online, and make new friends from the 1000 other detectorists that were there.



We had over 1200 acres to hunt in some vary historic farmland that had a lot of activity back in the Revolutionary War and War of 1812 periods. We had done our research and found that there was once a small little village in a field adjacent to the event staging area, next to the Little Chazy river, called Factoryville. The locals all refer to it as

“Suckertown.” There were no longer any signs of this town but using a metal detector, we were sure we could find it and we were interested in what kind of metal detecting finds would come up from the Suckertown area. This town had multiple buildings, and multiple mill sites. It didn’t take us, and hundreds of other detectorists that had




done the same research, long to locate the old road and locations of the old buildings. The hunt was on. One of the main historic events that happened close to this area was the Battle of Plattsburgh in 1814 between the British and the US. This battle is credited as one of the final battles that lead to the end of the War of 1812. The British HQ, where the commander and over 10,000 British troops camped was only about 10 miles away from these fields we were hunting in Chazy, NY, named The Scott House. In the second year of the War of 1812, a fleet of British ships sailed to attack the port town of Plattsburgh on Lake Champlain, while a coordinated land attack came from the North out of Canada and marched South towards Plattsburgh. The land attack was met with many skirmishes from an undermanned US Militia in the region that had elicited the

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help of any able bodied man in the area to take up arms. In a brilliant move, the commander of US forces who were concealed in the wood line but whose supply road was in site of the British, took small groups of soldiers and marched them out of the woods, out of sight, down the supply road, then back into the woods creating the illusion that our forces were constantly being reinforced by many more soldiers and supplies than we really had. When the Navy battle started, it roared through the area and the commander of British land forces hearing the battle was underway, chose to allow his soldiers to finish breakfast before taking up arms and getting into marching formations. The Navy battle was over in a short amount of time resulting in the British ships being defeated by a much smaller fleet of US ships. Seeing this defeat which was not supposed to happen, and also knowing that the US had been "reinforcing" their numbers for days, it was clear to the British commander that this was a lost cause so he made the decision to retreat back up into Canada and abandoned his attack plan on Plattsburgh. A few months later, a treaty was signed ending the War of 1812.



I found this War of 1812 pewter US Militia Cuff Button in the fields adjacent to Suckertown. How did that get there? Did it belong to one of the soldiers that turned back the British Army during that battle? Was this the site of one of the many skirmishes? These are the questions that get our minds turning and excite us as Metal Detectorists. I am so excited to have brought something home that ties to that period of time and in that area knowing what happened there. A very special find indeed for a guy from Colorado. BUYING & SELLING PRECIOUS METAL BULLION COINS

During these trying times, many folks have turned to precious metals as a hedge against inflation and rising taxes. Our dollar has less buying power each year. Gold traditionally does best in times of uncertainty, such as we are going thru now. I mean, if William Devane buys gold every chance he gets, it must be the right move. Well, it seems like a good idea, but it should not come as a surprise, there are several minor hitches. One of the problems with buying gold, or other precious metals as an investment is, it does not accrue any interest and you do not make any money until you sell it. Granted, at this time, I am making only 0.01% return in the monies in my Savings Account, but you can do a bit better investing in CDs or even considerably better in conservative stocks. With gold, you only make (or lose) money when you sell it. Of course, we all know the price of gold and silver go up and down constantly, as a reflection of confidence in the financial situation.



Precious metal dealers are in the business to make money. You are not going to buy at the precious metal spot price. All dealers will sell at a price above the spot price of the particular metal, and usually buy somewhere under spot prices. for precious metals, and the dealers ums, on top of melt value, charged chase a 1 oz. gold American Eagle prices, you would pay \$1,939, or oz. of gold. I worked up some precious metal purchase and selling figures. These figures were pulled from the JM Bullion website on March 26, 2021. Keep in mind, the prices of the various gold and silver items go up

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and down every day, and vary considerably, depending on the specific item bought or sold.

I looked up prices JM Bullion would pay to buy back several items, as of March 26, 2021:
 So, let us say you purchased a 1 oz. silver American Eagle round for \$34.64, while the spot price of silver was \$25.15. This would mean you spent \$9.49 (27.4%) over spot. So, \$25.15 plus \$9.49 equals \$34.64. So, the spot price of silver would have to reach at least \$34.64 an oz. to make your money back.

Of course, you would also have to add in shipping/insurance for items sent back to the Dealer to sell back.

Let us suppose you purchased a 1 oz. gold American Eagle for \$1,939.28, while at the spot price of gold was at \$1,739.29. This would mean you paid \$199.99 (10.3%) over the current spot. So, \$1,739.29 plus \$199.99 equals \$1,939.28. So, the spot price of gold would have to hit at least \$1,939.28 to start making a profit.

Should you turn right around and sell the above mentioned items immediately after you bought them, you would be taking a 9.0% or \$174.99 loss on the 1 oz. gold American Eagle, and a 21.6%, or \$7.49 loss on the 1 oz. silver American Eagle.

With high demand, the ability to even find various bullion coins for sale is uncertain. For example, the price listed for a Dos Pesos coin was \$91.82 at JM Bullion, but, of course, they did not have any in stock. There are people who want a bullion coin bad enough, and when one becomes available, they feel obligated to buy it before someone else does. People are panicking and want gold and silver, and are willing to pay the price. It doesn't take a mathematical genius to see, during these uncertain times, the precious metal dealers are literally taking it to the bank.

In summary, your best bet is to buy from a friend at near spot price as possible.


